frequently asked questions

What is the Every Member Canvass (EMC)? What does it support?

The Every Member Canvass (EMC) is the annual fundraising pledge campaign that supports the mission and yearly programs of the church. The EMC funds the Cathedral's annual operating budget to enable our common life and outreach in the community for the coming year. The EMC helps cover the costs of everything from lightbulbs and coffee cups to innovative programs and vital technology.

What is a pledge? And why should I pledge?

Parish members are asked to make a pledge of financial support to sustain our mission and ministry in the coming calendar year (2022). Making a pledge in response to God's call, like Isaiah, allows the vestry to budget responsibly and ensure with confidence that the Cathedral's programmatic needs will be met. Increases in pledge commitments and new pledges will allow us to make up the sizeable gap of lost revenue that is a result of economic circumstances beyond our control. The reduced returns from the parking garage, Treebeards restaurant, and the school means a greater percentage of our annual budget will need to come from parishioner pledges. Your gift will help us live fully into our vision for the future.

How do I fulfill my pledge?

Christ Church Cathedral operates fiscally on the calendar year — January to December. Pledges need not be paid now and may be adjusted during the year. Payments, which are tax deductible, may be made on your schedule, in a lump sum or installments, in cash, by check, credit card, and through our online giving portal. There are several payment options and you may select the one that works best for you. There are ever increasing ways to make giving to the church easy just like other non-profits — such as qualified charitable distributions from IRA accounts, contributions through Donor Advised Funds, and the gift of stocks or securities. letter from the stewardship council

In order to live into our vision action plan and faithfully enter God's future for Christ Church Cathedral, we need the financial support of every parishioner. The costs of financing Cathedral ministries, even at the level they currently exist, increase each year. Every gift counts, every pledge makes a difference, and every contribution renews our commitment to God, answering the call and saying, "Here I am. Send me."

We look forward to the new opportunities that God will set before us, and we invite your continued support through time, talent, and treasure to turn this vision for the future into a reality.

Ways to make your pledge



Standing at the entrance to the temple in Jerusalem, Isaiah saw the Lord in a vision. The Lord had a message to deliver to the nation of Judah, and He expressed His desire for a messenger.

The "Rooted in

Christ: Built on Christ" vision action plan is composed of strategic themes each one generative of the next.

These themes will guide our programming, investment of resources, and development for the next five years. Here are just some of the ways clergy, councils, and staff have been hard at work to incorporate these themes into the planning of ministry and programs.

sharing the good news

Isaiah was called as a messenger, and so we too must share the Gospel with others. For over a century, Christ Church has been known as a center for musical excellence, as music is an integral part of our worship and an essential piece to our ministry. The Cathedral Choirs produced four virtual choir projects, joining dozens of voices in harmony, and thus creating some of our most popular content on our virtual platforms. Children's Ministry teamed up with St. Martin's and St. John the Divine to create a globally shared Vacation Bible School and receiving over 5K views. Thanks to the livestream technology in place in the Cathedral, and now Reynolds Hall, virtual Sunday attendance has grown significantly both within and outside Houston. Our 1 p.m. La Santa Eucharistía (in Spanish) draws online worshipers from Venezuela, the Dominican Republic, Peru, El Salvador, and Ecuador regularly. Encuentro Juvenil, the Cathedral Youth virtual mission trip, connected youth from the Diocese of Texas and the Diocese of Costa Rica through a weekend of fostering friendships and inspiring collaboration. We will continue to empower our community to share the Good News of Jesus in all areas of our lives — breaking down the geographical boundaries of our church in ways never imagined before.

serving the world

It is a blessing to be called to the Body of Christ, but with that call we are expected to also be the hands and feet of Jesus. Outreach to our community, those who live on the margins, and the world has always been a pillar of the mission and ministry of Christ Church. Several of the "Rooted in Christ; Built on Christ" themes take outreach further to meet increased needs and identify new areas of support. Life's basic necessities are the core of The Beacon, offering resources to help Houston's homeless live a life of dignity and hope. The Beacon expanded its services exponentially in 2020, when most feeding ministries in the city suspended operations altogether. The Mission Outreach Council hosted the Alternative Giving Market and Christmas at the Cathedral on virtual platforms, offering their support to non-profit organizations serving underserved people of the city of Houston. Our At Risk Youth Program assisted an unprecedented number of families in crisis, providing a lifeline to those in dire need due to either pandemic or its associated economic fallout. And later this fall the Caring for God's Good Earth task force will present recommendations to the vestry on how to green the world around us and educate our congregation to be good stewards of the earth. With servant hands and hearts of all ages, we will put faith into action to amplify and enhance our outreach to Houston's communities.

formation inspires fellowship

When you focus on formation that transforms both the mind and the heart, organically you create space for meaningful fellowship among communities big and small. Hundreds of parishioners participated in intentional small groups throughout the past year and a half — starting with Acts in Easter, moving through Cathedral Reads, and engaging with Via Cathedral. The Adult Formation Council has been training small group facilitators to grow future opportunities for small group programming. Cathedral created curriculum, like Acts in Easter, has been offered to the wider church and used in other faith communities across the country allowing Episcopalians beyond our walls to foster relationships with one another and Christ. Bible studies, Youth Summer Shade, the Knitters and Crocheters group, Young Adult hangouts, Children's Ministry's Donuts & Devos in the Driveway, and Bridge/Rummikub night all provided opportunities to create deeper connections while acquiring new skills and knowledge through a lens of faith.

embracing all people

Christ Church is committed to being an open, loving, and diverse parish that embraces all who wish to know God in this place. The Pastoral Care Council has done good work to build community among those who care for loved ones with dementia/Alzheimer's Disease. Through the council's Rapid Response team, volunteers worked to assist the emerging technology needs of many so everyone could stay connected electronically. The Justice and Peace Council engages in work to embrace our LGBTQ+ community through programs such as Coming Out in Church, creating safe space for conversation and the struggles they, their families and friends experience. In addition to holding a two-day racial reconciliation conference in May 2021, this fall the council hosted a series to provide education and enlightenment on combatting anti-Semitism. Marcia Quintanilla and the Cathedral Youth participated in a five week focus group using an award-winning book Stamped: Racism, Antiracism, and You. We will work together to better understand and meet all people wherever they are in their journey of life; to welcome them, love them, and help them find their spiritual home.
